

Basics of Bibliographies – Electronic Sources (Credit to Purdue OWL)

Basic Electronic Source Format

Last Name, First Name. “Article or Page Title.” *Title of Website*. City of Publisher name and Publish date. URL. Date accessed.

Book Example (One Author)

Editors, History.com. “Alfred the Great.” History.com, *A&E Television Networks*, 30 May 2012, www.history.com/topics/middle-ages/dark-ages-barbarians-ii-the-saxons-alfred-video. 28 Jan. 2019.

Important – EBSCO and Encyclopedia Britannica are not web sources – they are databases. For them, use the built-in Citation button to cite them. For EBSCO, use the permalink button for the URL (not the normal URL in your browser).
